DRAFT Youth SUD Treatment Services Needs Assessment Findings

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Youth SUD Population

- U.S. Census:
 - California population for 2017 nearly 39.5 million
 - -23.2 percent are under the age of 18
- CalOMS Tx:
 - Thousands <18 admitted to SUD treatment
 - FY 2013-14 Approximately 15,000 youth
 - FY 2014-15 A little over 12,000 youth



Drug and Alcohol-induced Deaths Ages 15-19 1999-2015

- Deaths occurred throughout the state
- Higher death rates in southern California
 - Areas with higher population, for example, San Diego, Los Angeles, San Bernardino
 - ->62-207
 - One death is one too many

Youth <18 Admitted in DHCS Monitored Facility by County

- Spread throughout the state
- Higher concentration in southern California
 - Counts over 500
 - For example, San Diego, Riverside, Tulare, Fresno
 - Counts 100-499
 - For example, San Bernardino, Kern, San Luis Obispo, Monterey
 - Counts 1-99 primarily in central to northern
 California

Locations of Department of Social Services Certified Group Homes


- 193 residential beds

 - Sacramento, Placer, Sonoma, Marin, Santa Cruz, Santa Clara



CalOMS Residential Treatment Data for Transitional Age Youth (18-24)






Findings: Access Challenges to Treatment Services

- -Seasonal conditions




Youth (<18) Admitted to publicly-funded SUD Treatment by Zip Code Median Household Income Range (San Diego County)



Zip Code Median Household Income Range




FY 2014-2015 Youth (<18) Admitted to DHCS monitored SUD Treatment by Race/Ethnicity (n = 12,120)






Cohort Data 2013-14 Graduation and Dropout Rates by Race/Ethnicity




Ethnic/Racial Designation









Age of First Use

Age of First Use for Youth (<18) in DHCS monitored SUD Treatment FY 2013-14 (n=14,946)





Primary Prevention Services by Age FY 2013-14












FY 2013-14 Primary Drug of Use at Admission by Race/Ethnicity





FY 2014-15 Primary Drug of Use at Admission by Race/Ethnicity



FY 2014-15 Substance Use Disorder Drug Reported at Admission (FY 2014-15) Ages 18-24









Workforce Development

- Shortage of trained workforce
- Gap in higher education curriculum for behavioral health professionals specializing in youth SUD
- Limitations in continuing education courses



Workforce Development cont'd.

- Licensed Practitioner of the Healing Arts (LPHA) or California certified counselor staff requirement
- Department of Education and other oversight agency collaboration



FUNDING

- Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment Block Grant
- FY 2013-14
 - -\$7.3 Million for youth SUD treatment
 - -25,720 youth served
 - -\$285 per youth



Drug Medi-Cal Funding

- Outpatient and residential SUD treatment services
- Outpatient drug-free programs
- Narcotic treatment programs



Moving Forward

- Strategies to fill gaps
 Build SUD infrastructure
- Statewide SUD treatment system of care for youth
