Family PACT

- Family PACT is designed primarily to assist individuals with a medical necessity for family planning services.
- Overall goal is to ensure low-income women and men, including adolescents, have access to health information, counseling, and family planning services to reduce the likelihood of unintended pregnancy and to maintain optimal reproductive health.



Family PACT

- Eligibility Requirements:
 - Resident of California
 - Total taxable family income at or below 200% of Federal Poverty Level
 - No other source of health care coverage for family planning services
 - Medical necessity for family planning services



Family PACT Services


- Family planning services include:
 - All FDA approved contraceptive methods
 - Male & female sterilization
 - Specified reproductive health screening tests
- Family planning-related services include:
 - Sexually Transmitted Infection (STI) diagnosis and treatment
 - Cancer screening


Adolescent Clients: Age Distribution





Adolescent Clients: Gender

- FY 2013/14
 - 83% Female
 - 17% Male
- FY 2014/15
 - 81% Female
 - 19% Male
- FY 2015/16
 - 80% Female
 - 20% Male
- Larger percentage of males in youngest age subgroup.





Adolescent Clients: Ethnicity

≤ 14 Years Old

- 61% Latino
- 16% Caucasian
- 13% African American
- 5% Asian & Pacific Islander
- 5% Other (Including Native American)


≥ 15 Years Old

- 59% Latino
- 22% Caucasian
- 8% African American
- 7% Asian & Pacific Islander
- 4% Other (Including Native American)



Adolescent Clients: Primary Language


- English is the most spoken language by all Family PACT clients under 20 years of age
 - 83% English
 - 15% Spanish
 - 2% Other






Providers Who Serve Adolescents

 The majority of adolescent clients are seen by public providers.






Adolescents: Services Provided



- Contraceptives include: Barrier Methods, Oral Contraceptive Pills, Hormone Injections, Patch, Ring, Implant, Intrauterine Contraceptive (IUC) and Emergency Contraception.
- STI Testing includes: Chlamydia, Gonorrhea, HIV, HPV, HSV and Syphilis
- Labs include: Pregnancy Testing, Method Related Testing, and Other Laboratory Testing
- Clinical Services include: Education & Counseling (E&C), Evaluation & Management (E&M), and E&M New claims




Adolescent Services: Contraceptives






Adolescent Services: Pharmacy

Issues/Challenges

- Access to family planning services
 - Transportation to appointments
 - Lack of knowledge about available options
 - Medical release from schools
 - Confusion on how to complete Client Eligibility Form (Income)
- Quality of sexual health education
 - Myths
 - Lack of Parental/Guardian involvement and/or education
- Gender Bias Sexual Orientation



Obstacles to Care: Solutions

- Improving Sexual Health education
 - Peer to peer youth outreach
 - Health educators accessible to/in schools
 - Family planning services accessible in schools or clinics close to schools
 - Parent training
- Clinician training
 - Placement of LARCs (Subdermal implants, IUDs)



Obstacles to Care: Solutions

- Funding for teen education programs
- Reimbursement for transportation (Uber vouchers)
- Support from local government leadership
 - Prioritize family planning access and support for sex education in schools
